
IN-PERSON ORAL PRESENTATIONS: DUE AUGUST 1

Oral presentations are 15 minutes, which includes time for 1-2 clarifying questions. Presentations will be grouped by topic with 5 presentations in a 90-minute time block. The last 15 minutes of each session will be used for Q&A and discussion with all presenters. Oral presentations will be scheduled in concurrent session blocks on December 5, 6, or 7.



VIRTUAL ORAL PRESENTATIONS: DUE AUGUST 1

For presenters that cannot travel to Monterey, we invite you to submit a prerecorded oral presentation and participate in a live Q&A. Presentations can be up to 20 minutes in length and will be available for viewing on-demand, any time after the congress begins. While we will not have a specific time in the program for attendees to view your presentation, we will group 3-5 virtual presentations by topic and provide a 45-minute time period for live question and answer with the presenters. These sessions will be hosted on Dec 5, 6, and 7.



IN-PERSON POSTER PRESENTATIONS: DUE AUGUST 25

Poster presenters will share their poster in a poster session on Tuesday, December 5 in Monterey, where they can interact with attendees and respond to questions. Posters will be displayed throughout the week.
